Regulatory Changes for G-Reg Stampes

The position to date

Following the meeting last November with the CAA courtesy of the offices of AOPA in London and the follow up correspondence (a euphemism for persistence). It would seem that there is now 'more than a little light at the end of the tunnel'! In this respect, it is encouraging to learn that the CAA are considering a 'dual approach' whereby Stampes may go from a C of A to a Permit to Fly. Consequently, it would not be possible to import an aircraft directly onto a Permit to Fly. In other words, it would be necessary to obtain a C of A in the first place and then transfer to a Permit to Fly if so desired.

If all this happens, it will, as you can imagine, be a most welcome change of policy on behalf of the CAA to whom some credit must be given. Hopefully, this change of policy will allow all Stampes (presently operating on a Private Category C of A) to consider transferring to a Permit to Fly whereas any Stampes being used commercially will need to stay on a Public Transport Category C of A. Indeed, it is also worth adding that there are a few private owners who also wish to stay on a C of A for a multitude of reasons.
